

Alexander Blackburn McMenemy (BEM)

Better known to St Paul's as Alex McMenemy, who was recently awarded The British Empire Medal (BEM) for his voluntary service to the Scottish Schools Football Association (SSFA) and to the Scottish Football Association (SFA).

The 77-year-old's commitment over a span of more than 50 years to youth football, on this voluntary basis, has been described as "incomparable."

Alex, formally a PE teacher at St Cuthbert's in Johnstone before becoming deputy head teacher at Renfrew High School from 1975 until 1998, has worked his way through the ranks, from representing Paisley and District schools in the early 1970s to holding a seat on the Scottish FA's Congress.

His career has seen an impressive array of accolades, including being named as honorary treasurer of the Scottish Schools Football Association (SSFA) in 1995, whilst his work made him a natural choice as the inaugural Chair of the Scottish FA's (SFA) West Region Committee in 2005.

In an interview with the Gazette, Alex stated: "I am obviously very honoured and quite delighted about the whole thing, but with the Scottish Schools, there are many members there who have been doing many years of schools football. I think the thing that maybe tipped it in my Honours list was that I ran our schools lottery with the help of my wife and family for 29 years from 1986 until 2015."

He introduced the SSFA Lottery in 1986, and then promoted it nationwide for almost three decades. During this time the lottery raised around £750,000 with half of the money going to the Scottish School's main accounts and half to the participating schools throughout Scotland.

His sustained contribution has been instrumental in promoting the sport across the country and extending its reach beyond the traditional male environment. In practice, his service has involved attending

trials, training, organising national and international fixtures, heading delegations, finding sponsors, liaising with local schools across the country and ensuring congruence with the parent body of the SFA to name but a few.

Alex mentioned the continued support from his wife Ethel saying "she is the one that deserves the most credit for putting up with all these years of schools football. She has been incredible, a great assistance to me. It's only now you get to my age that you get to realise how perhaps selfish you are with



hobby and she's been my rock."

Everyone in St Paul's Church congratulate Alex on this wonderful achievement.

Once again, we were delighted to have the children from St. Paul's Junior Drama who came along and entertained us, well done to Linda Rae and all her team for the way the children performed.



St. Paul's Junior Drama

Remember Colin Rae

Colin Rae's Involvement with St. Paul's Church Dramatic Society 1983 – 2023.

In the early 1980's the Dramatic Society was struggling to keep going and the Minister at the time was willing to come along and share his wealth of theatrical experience. He staged two plays "Sailor Beware" and "Boeing Boeing". At this time the lighting board on the stage in the old St. Paul's was in need of repair. Colin was asked if he could come along and get the lighting board up and running. Colin repaired it, but also ended up taking a leading role in "Boeing Boeing". After the plays the club extended in membership and a decision was made to put on a Pantomime. Over the next three years we produced three pantomimes Sinbad the Sailor, Cinderella and Jack and the Beanstalk this not only provided



great fun rehearsing but also helped to raise funds for the New St. Paul's. Colin played the roles of the dames in Sinbad









"Semolina" and in Cinderella one the Ugly Sisters "Davinia". In Jack and the Beanstalk he was the "Baddie" Draculstein.

Colin helped with the decision to take our productions to Johnstone Town Hall, a big step but it paid off. We started putting on musicals the first being "Oklahoma".

At this point Colin took on the role of Stage Manager then after a few years he directed many shows. A big highlight for Colin was the success of the production of "Godspell" which took place in the Church. This production was also taken to a Church in Barrhead. He also directed The Scottish Amateur Premiere of "Children of Eden". Colin always wanted to tackle "Jesus Christ Superstar" but the Society never had enough men to play the roles. In 1995 Colin directed "Annie Get Your Gun" and several children took part in this venture. The enthusiasm of the children gave Colin the idea for Linda to establish a Junior Section which is still providing Music and Drama for children today. In 2015 Colin had been involved in the committee for the staging in the new Town Hall. We were very happy to be the first Dramatic Society to hold the first musical there "Me and My Girl" As well as being involved in the productions Colin also took on the role of President of the Society several times over the years and was honoured to become an Honorary Member. He was also involved in helping arrange various Anniversary Dinners at The Lynnhurst Hotel. Colin attended along with many other members the Scottish Noda conferences at Peebles Hydro over the years and many Drama outings to see other amateur shows and visits to Seamill Hydro. In 2018 Colin was saddened when the Society folded as no other members were interested in taking over the reins. He was delighted the Junior Section had continued and hoped it would continue to grow. So many children, former members that Colin had worked with attended his funeral in November of last year. His love of the theatre will live on
